SYNOPSIS

Prohibits dumping dredge spoils on and around islands without municipal approval.

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1 AN ACT concerning dumping dredge spoils on islands and 2 supplementing P.L.1987, C.156 (C.13:9B-1 et seq.). 3 4 BE IT ENACTED by the Senate and General Assembly of the State 5 of New Jersey: 6 7 The Legislature finds and declares: 1. 8 Burlington Island, located on the Delaware River, has been a. 9 under local control since the mid-19th century and activity thereon, 10 since that time, has been subject to restrictions established by general law for the benefit of the City of Burlington; 11 12 b. Currently, Burlington Island comprises the entirety of Block 230 on the Burlington City Tax Map, with title to Lot 1, 13 14 approximately 242 acres located on the southern portion of the 15 island, held by the City of Burlington, and title to Block 230, Lot 2, 16 approximately 190 acres on the northern section of the island, held 17 by the Board of Island Managers, established by the Legislature in 18 the 19th century; 19 c. Pursuant to P.L.1998, c.119, all land on Burlington Island is 20 to remain exclusively in the public domain for recreational, conservational, educational or cultural use, with supporting 21 22 facilities permitted; 23 The Department of Environmental Protection, in conjunction d. 24 with the Army Corps of Engineers, intends to subvert the intent of 25 the Legislature and dump potentially hazardous dredge spoils on 26 Burlington Island; 27 Any attempt to use Burlington Island as a waste disposal site e. would be entirely inappropriate and antithetical to the Legislature's 28 29 attempts to establish local control of the island for the purposes of 30 benefitting the education of the children of the City of Burlington; 31 f. Therefore, it is necessary and appropriate to restrict State 32 action on the island to maintain the protections established by the 33 Legislature for the benefit of the City of Burlington nearly 200 34 years ago. 35 36 2. a. The department shall not approve any dumping of 37 dredge spoils on any portion of a Delaware River island owned or 38 controlled by the State or a political subdivision of the State, 39 including riparian land, located on a Delaware River island 40 controlled in whole or in part by a Board of Island Managers 41 established by the Legislature, unless (1) the department petitions 42 each municipality owning land on that island to authorize the 43 dumping of dredge spoils on or around the island, and (2) each 44 municipality petitioned by the department pursuant to this section 45 adopts an ordinance authorizing the dumping of dredge spoils on or 46 around the island. This section shall be applicable to all dumping 47 of dredge spoils, including any proposed dumping on an existing 48 dredge spoil bank.

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1 b. For the purposes of this section:

2 "Department" means the Department of Environmental3 Protection.

4 "Dredge spoils" means unconsolidated, randomly mixed 5 sediments composed of one or more of the following: rock, soil, or 6 shell materials extracted and deposited during dredging and 7 dumping activities.

8 "Dredge spoil bank" means a subaerial mound or ridge that 9 permanently stands above the water composed of dredge spoils; 10 randomly mixed sediments deposited during dredging and dumping. 11

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- 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
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STATEMENT

17 This bill would prohibit the Department of Environmental 18 Protection from approving any dumping of dredge spoils on any 19 portion of a Delaware River island owned or controlled by the State 20 or a political subdivision of the State, including riparian land, located on a Delaware River island controlled in whole or in part by 21 22 a Board of Island Managers established by the Legislature, unless 23 (1) the department petitions each municipality owning land on that 24 island to authorize the dumping of dredge spoils on or around the 25 island, and (2) each municipality petitioned by the department 26 pursuant to this section adopts an ordinance authorizing the 27 dumping of dredge spoils on or around the island. This section 28 shall be applicable to all dumping of dredge spoils, including any 29 proposed dumping on an existing dredge spoil bank.

30 The only current island in the Delaware River that is controlled 31 by a Board of Island Managers established by the Legislature is 32 Burlington Island, located on the Delaware Burlington Island. 33 River, has been under local control since the mid-19th and activity 34 thereon, since that time, has been subject to restrictions established 35 by general law for the benefit of the City of Burlington. Currently, 36 Burlington Island comprises the entirety of Block 230 on the 37 Burlington City Tax Map, with title to Lot 1, approximately 242 38 acres located on the southern portion of the island, held by the City 39 of Burlington, and Block 230, Lot 2, approximately 190 acres on 40 the northern section of the island, is owned by the Island Managers, 41 established by the Legislature in the 19th century.

Pursuant to P.L.1998, c.119, all land on Burlington Island is to
remain exclusively in the public domain for recreational,
conservational, educational or cultural use, with supporting
facilities permitted. The Department of Environmental Protection,
in conjunction with the Army Corps of Engineers, intends to

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subvert the intent of the Legislature and dump potentially hazardous 1 2 dredge spoils on Burlington Island. Any attempt to use Burlington 3 Island as a waste disposal site would be entirely inappropriate and 4 antithetical to the Legislature's attempts to establish local control of 5 the island for the purposes of benefitting the education of the 6 children of the City of Burlington; Accordingly, it is necessary and appropriate to restrict State 7 8 action on the island to maintain the protections established by the 9 Legislature for the benefit of the City of Burlington nearly 200

10 years ago.
